SCHOLARSHIP FUND DONATIONS

The German program wishes to thank Dr. Craig Melchert (MSU '67) for a generous supplementary gift to the Endowed Scholarship Fund for German Language and Culture in Mayen, Germany, which is an MSU summer study abroad program that is led yearly by a German program faculty member. The program just completed the 43rd year in Mayen. Dr. Melchert received his BA in German from MSU.

Thank you also to Thomas and Sarah Juntune for their establishment of the Thomas W. and Sarah L. Juntune Endowed Scholarship for Study Abroad in Freiburg. Thomas Juntune is a former faculty member in the MSU German program and led the program in Freiburg. Sarah Juntune is a retired area German teacher and currently teaches for the Michigan Virtual School.





In March the MSU Russian Club hosted Zolotoj Plyos, an internationally renowned Russian folk band from the Saratov Conservatory in Russia. The three-person band played over 20 authentic folk instruments and performed in native dress. The event was sponsored by the Department of Linguistics and Languages as well as several other departments on campus.

TAIWAN FILM FESTIVAL

Since 2013, the Chinese Program has been presenting to the campus community and the general public a variety of Chinese-language films by directors working in mainland China, Hong Kong, Taiwan, the US, and the UK. The 2016 Taiwan Film Festival was comprised of five films by three directors, two of whom were invited to campus from Taiwan. Faculty members, Tze-lan Sang (Department of Linguistics and Languages) and Sheng-mei Ma (English Department), jointly curated the films.

The featured films this year were: Huang Yushan's *Spring Cactus* (1999) and *The Taste of Life* (2015); Hou Hsiao-hsien's *The Assassin* (2015); Lin Cheng-sheng's *Murmur of Youth* (1999); and *Betelnut Beauty* (2001).

The film festival was made possible by the generous sponsorship from the Taiwan Ministry of Education (through TECO-Chicago) and the MSU Asian Studies Center. Support was also provided by the Department of Linguistics and Languages, the Film Studies Program in English, the Global Studies in the Arts and Humanities, and the Center for Gender in Global Context.

GERMANY - 25 YEARS OF UNITY CELEBRATION

Funded through a grant from the Embassy of the Federal Republic, the German program commemorated and reflected on 25 years of East and West Germany uniting through a variety of events during fall semester. Activities included a large public event, film series, and student essay competition. "Germany Today: The Legacy of Unification" was a panel discussion with topics that included soccer's role in national identity, German education reform, gender issues and Germany's role in addressing the world refugee crisis.

The film series titled, "Imagining Germany Beyond East and West", exposed audiences to a wide range of perspectives from both the former East and the West, thematizing the complex processes of social and cultural unification. Introductions and post-screening discussions were led by German faculty and graduate students.

Finally, the student project competition titled "Vereinigtes Deutschland!?-Contemporary Perspectives on German Life and Culture" was open to MSU students in German classes as well as area high school students. The students were encouraged to create written essays or multi-media projects reflecting upon the historical events and processes that contributed to, and resulted from, unification.

RAISING THE DEPARTMENT PROFILE GRANTS

The Department was very excited to be able award four "Raising the Dept Profile" grants from associated monies from Dean Long. These grants resulted in three successful mini-conferences and funded one research project. Thanks go to Dean Long as well as the other associated sponsors of these events.

The series kicked off on March 25th with "'Them Damned Pictures: Explorations in African and Middle Eastern Political Cartoon Art" organized by Prof. Sadam Issa from the Arabic Program. The keynote was given by Tejumola Olaniyan, Louise Durham Mead Professor in the Departments of English & African Languages and Literature from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

On April 1-2, there was a timely, two-day symposium on the "European Migration Crisis: A Two-Day Conference for Scholars/Community Members," which was organized by Prof. Johanna Schuster-Craig in German. Highlights included a keynote address from the German Consul General of Chicago, Mr. Herbert Quelle, a second keynote from Dr. Demetri Papademetriou from the Migration Policy Institute-Europe, and Ms. Salam Darwaza, a film producer from 1001 Media. The symposium ended with a screening of her documentary film *Salam Neighbor* (2015) and discussion.

On April 22, there was a Linguistics and Languages Roundtable entitled "Translingual Practices in an Age of Globalization" and organized by Prof. Peter de Costa of the SLS/MA TESOL programs. Guest speaker Professor Suresh Canagarajah, an internationally acclaimed linguist from Pennsylvania State University, gave the keynote.

Finally, Linguistics Professor Cristina Schmitt received a grant to fund her research project entitled "Strengthening Latin-American connections: a way to raise the department profile." We look forward to hearing more about the results in a Linguistics Colloquium talk this Fall.

WORLD LANGUAGES DAY



Chinese major, Christopher Murphy, gave the keynote address at the ninth annual World Languages Day (WLD) conference in April 2016. Hundreds of high school students, teachers, administrators and parents participated in the day-long conference sponsored by the Center for Language Education and Research (CLEAR). A significant number of conference presenters and volunteers were faculty, staff and students from the Department of Linguistics and Languages.

Mellon Foundation to lead a multi-university research project to strengthen the teaching of less commonly taught languages (LCTLs). The Center for Language Teaching Advancement (CeLTA) will direct this initiative on behalf of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly CIC). Since the LCTL program is housed in Linguistics and Languages, we look forward to working with CeLTA and our Big Ten colleagues to improve the quality of and access to instruction in these languages. I wish to congratulate all of those involved in writing this grant, particularly Susan Gass, David Prestel, Angelika Kraemer, and Danielle Steider. NEW STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMS

ARABIC IN JORDAN

The department launched a new study abroad program in Amman, Jordan in the summer of 2015. The program is offered at the Jordan Language Academy (JLA) and is directed by Arabic instructor, Sadam Issa. This intensive nine-week program focuses on Arabic language and culture and allows students to earn two semesters of Arabic language credit at multiple levels.



Students can also take one credit courses on the Levant dialect, Arabic culture and Arabic Media.

Students live with host families and can participate in voluntary work and many other learning activities such as cultural excursions and clubs.

Arabic major and 2016 program participant, Brandon Parker, had this to say, "Jordan is going great! I'm having a wonderful time and meeting some wonderful people while I'm bettering my language skills."

NEW JAPAN PROGRAM FOR TESOL MINORS

The *Teaching English in Japan* (TEJ) program was started at the Japan Center for Michigan Universities (JCMU) in Hikone, Japan in Summer 2015. The new program provides students from Michigan universities and other partner institutions an opportunity to learn about a variety of English as a Second/Foreign Language teaching methodologies, and to apply them to the context of EFL teaching in Japan. JCMU provides a classroom focus on theory and useful activities, complemented by class observations and face-to-face work with English-language learners at all levels and ages in the community and at local schools and universities.

Teaching English in Japan is credited through JCMU as Michigan State University's LLT 307 class, although a limited number of spaces are available for students wishing to complete the course as a practicum for a TESOL minor through LLT 496.

In addition, students who join the TEJ program at JCMU will also be enrolled in the JCMU Japanese Culture & Society course, a three-credit class (AL 400) that explores the foundations of Japan as a country through lectures, guest speakers, cultural activities, and field trips.

MAX KADE VISITING PROFESSOR - CHRISTIAN KLEIN



Christian Klein: No one ever asked my friends who intended to study medicine or engineering for the reasons of their choices. I was always asked why I wanted to study German literature. My answer was one of irritation and defiance: Simply because I want to! I still think that this is a reasonable answer, but today I would add: Because literature deals with the three great questions:

Who are we? Where do we come from? Where are we going? In other words: Literature explores the "conditio humana", what makes the human being a human being? Literature asks how culture and society became the entity that shapes our lives today. And literature outlines scenarios of what our life might look like in the future. And please tell me: what else would you expect from studying at a university?

I did my Doctorate in Comparative Literature at the Freie Universität in Berlin. I knew quite early that I would like to continue my academic career, so I was very lucky when I got a job at the Bergische Universität Wuppertal, where I still work. My current fields of interest are contemporary German writers (like Marcel Beyer), comics and graphic novels, and recently I published a book that answers the question of how a book can become a cult book.

I have enjoyed the time in Michigan a lot. I really like the combination of a small city, where you can reach everything by bike, with a large university (MSU has lots more students than the Freie Universität Berlin) with a lively campus life. And because we Germans are well known for our ecological awareness, I can easily join in with the slogan "Go green!". ;-)

Editor's note: Dr. Klein's visit was such a success in Spring 2016 that he will join the German program again in spring 2017.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT



Bailey Smith (BA Linguistics '12)

After graduating from MSU with a BA in Linguistics in 2012, I nannied until my husband's work moved us to Denmark in February of 2014. After moving, I started learning Danish at the language school (a free 3-year course for internationals provided by the government), and my fluency is a great party trick for impressing my Danish friends. I recently started teaching English to adults at an upper intermediate level, and finishing my Danish course will mean I can begin teaching adults less fluent in English. In 2016, I started an MS in Information Architecture at Aalborg University in which I apply what I love about linguistics: how people create and use a shared system of understanding to communicate. IA is a field that focuses on helping users find information and complete tasks by connecting the users, the content, and the context. At Aalborg University, we are encouraged to find real cases around which to create our semester project in application of the theories learned during the course. Working in the Sociolinguistics Lab at MSU and writing my senior thesis equipped me to identify appropriate research methods as well as to understand the theoretical and practical impact of my work.

For the past 20 years, MidPhon has served successfully as an annual phonetics/phonology conference for faculty and students of the Big Ten Academic Alliance and Mid-West research institutions to disseminate research findings, to exchange ideas, and to seek collaboration opportunities. We are excited to bring MidPhon to MSU for the first time in 2016.
